Greyt Help Wanted!

We are very pleased that people have been stepping up to help us out, and we'd like to see that trend continue! If anyone is out there and is willing to volunteer for a task, please contact us. We always have way too much to do and too few people to do it, and welcome new people and new ideas to our group. What follows is a list of things for which we need help. And I'm sure that there are a lot of things you could think of that we haven't considered, so please do get in touch with us and give us your ideas!

- ◆ **Foster Homes:** This is a critical aspect of GPA's successful adoption of ex-racers, and a chance for love. We need all the foster homes we can get, so we can take more dogs as they grade off the tracks. When the tracks open in May, there are almost always dogs that come off the track very soon thereafter. Racers are culled continuously, so this is a continuing need. We can work around your needs, and even if you only want to foster a couple of times a year, it is still a very big help. We feel strongly that fostering helps create the best matches!
- ◆ **Donations** of the following items are gratefully accepted: money, blankets, towels, crates (portable kennels that house a single dog), veterinary care, advertising, printing, and publishing.
- ◆ **Dog Washes:** We do the bathing before the dogs get their first veterinary care. This is an opportunity to be among the first to give a newly retired racer a big hug (sometimes a wet one) and loving care, and share in the excitement of watching another beauty emerge.
- ◆ **Transportation:** We need volunteers during the daytime to transport the dogs to and from vet appointments, or from the farms or tracks. Each ride is an opportunity to give a little more reassurance to a greyhound friend who is entering a new world.
- ◆ **Home during the day:** Events or errands often need to be accomplished during weekdays when many of our volunteers are at work. Let us know if your schedule would allow you to help with weekday events or errands. Many fun greyhound surprises have popped up during the week!
- ◆ **Newsletter:** Can you help fold, stamp, and mail our quarterly newsletter? Would you write an article or report on an event for us?
- ◆ **Schmooze Kings and Queens:** Do you meet people easily? Do you know a lot of people and businesses? Could you sell ad space in our newsletter, or find companies willing to sponsor an issue of the newsletter? Could you ask local merchants to donate raffle items for our fundraising efforts?

- ◆ **PR Assistance** - Do you have a FAX machine and/or an email account? Would you be willing to FAX and/or email our event notices to the local newspapers and other media outlets? We'll do the writing, if you can do the sending!
- ◆ **Telephone calling:** We continually make telephone calls to remind people of upcoming Demo's, follow-up calls to foster parents or new adopters, or handling requests for information from volunteers. This does not involve soliciting for donations. If you enjoy talking on the phone and talking about greyhounds, this job is for you.
- ◆ **Demos:** These events allow the greyhounds to help each other by simply being themselves in public and showing people who they are—they do the Showing, we do the Telling!
- ◆ **Recycle leashes and collars:** If you have old collars and leads around that you no longer need but still have some life in them, please send 'em to us!
- ◆ **Other:** suggestions for promotional events that would introduce more people to greyhounds, fundraising events, good locations for Demos, donations of dog food or bathing supplies which you can arrange, eBay benefit auctions, *whatever you like to do.*

She retired from racing at age 5 and began a second career as a professional mom. She had two litters; one from Oshkosh Racey, and one from P's Raising Cain.

An angel named Donna, who owns racing greyhounds, met Chelsie at the breeding farm in Oklahoma where her own pups were being raised. The farmer told her that Chelsie's owner didn't want her anymore, and he (the farmer) did not want to put her down. The farmer asked Donna if she could possibly get Chelsie adopted. He did not know if anybody would want a 7 year old brood mama, but he really liked Chelsie. Well, Donna adopts out her own dogs, so why not help this one, too? The farmer now had one more place to go for help when he needed a place for a retiring brood. She put the word out with her pals on the Internet, and a nice lady named Liz said she'd adopt Chelsie, sight unseen.



So off Chelsie went, from the farm in Oklahoma to a race kennel in the upper Midwest, where Lynn, a friendly race trainer, had offered to give her a "beauty makeover" before she met Liz. While Chelsie was resting in a race dog's crate at the track kennel, another owner came by and asked what this dog was doing there. Lynn told him that she was a retiring brood mama who was having a beauty treatment before going off to be adopted. "Adopted?!" he said. "No kidding! I didn't know anybody would bother adopting

one of these old girls." Score another "win" for Chelsie, as she let yet another person know, simply by her presence, that yes, people do have places in their hearts and homes for the older girls. The owner now brings his broods to these ladies for adoption.

Chelsie and her angel (who used her own frequent flyer miles to pay for the tickets) then made an exciting plane ride together, to upstate New York, where Liz fell in love with her. She lived with Liz, her family, and a number of other hounds for another 5 years. When Liz was losing her battle with cancer, Chelsie came to live with us.

Chelsie made her mark in our family in very short order. She was a "party girl" from the word GO, and sure lived it up! She stole tastes of wine, demanded rides in a swing, loved the beach, and kissed us every day. She loved all the little children in the neighborhood. She gave our hound, Willy, confidence just by being next to him. Her presence and spunky personality livened up our home for the 6 months more that she lived with us. And while we grieve our loss, she is still making strides for brood mamas, since we'll surely have another one in our family someday. She made every moment count!

Recipe Kennel

Pumpkin Spice Biscuits

Preheat oven to 350°F.

- 1½ cups unbleached flour
- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup cornmeal
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- ½ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon ground allspice
- ½ cup canned pumpkin
- 1 large egg slightly beaten
- 1 cup water

1. Mix flours, cornmeal, brown sugar, and spices in large bowl.
2. Add pumpkin, egg, and water.
3. Knead dough with hands until smooth and stiff.
4. Roll dough out and use cookie cutters to cut biscuits.
5. Place biscuits on slightly greased cookie sheet.
6. Bake for 30-45 minutes or until lightly brown.
7. Turn oven to 150°F (or to low/warm setting) and leave in oven for 4-5 hours or until hard.

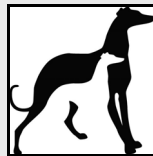

GPA-CNHC Policy

To all of our members, please be reminded that GPA-CNHC adheres to National GPA Policy and Procedure. The primary objectives are to:

1. Locate responsible, loving homes for greyhounds that fail to qualify, or no longer qualify, for the racetrack.
2. Educate the public about greyhounds, stressing their desirability as pets.

The GPA position is that we are primarily interested in the welfare of the greyhound. We are NOT animal activists, nor an animal rights organization. However, GPA will take appropriate action if we see a greyhound mistreated or abused. We will do what needs to be done to get the abuse stopped as quickly as possible through the proper authorities.

GPA is politically NEUTRAL and is neither pro- nor anti-racing. GPA representatives are required to remain factual on all issues. If engaged in conversation which moves toward negative issues, we can best serve the greyhounds by emphasizing what wonderful pets they make and why. It is possible that upon determination that a member has engaged in conduct materially and seriously prejudicial to the interests or purposes of GPA, they will be terminated from this organization.
